In Memory

Dorothy was born in 1922 to Emma and Charles Blackman in Richview, Illinois. Dorothy and Emma moved to Normal, IL for Dorothy's schooling. In the summertime, Dorothy would visit her half siblings, Floyd, Eula Mae, Maude, and Glen. On the advice of a fortune teller, Emma enrolled Dorothy in music lessons.

After high school, Dorothy and Emma moved to Fort Wayne, IN. Dorothy worked in a factory and joined the Fort Wayne Philharmonic as a cellist where she met the principal French horn player, Phillip Huffman. Dorothy and Phil were married on April 4th, 1942.

As the Second World War concluded, Dorothy and Phil welcomed their

first daughter, Phyllis Ann Huffman (Herman) in 1946. Fourteen months later, in 1947, their second daughter, Martha Rae Huffman (Barcus) was born. In 1948 they moved the family to Indianapolis. Dorothy took a class in stenography so that she could find work while Phil played



in the Indianapolis Symphony.

Dorothy became the stenographer for Judge John Niblack in the circuit court in the 1950s. In the 1960s she started her own successful business, Huffman Reporting Service, which lasted until her retirement in 2012. She was a member of the National Court Reporters Association and received a plaque for her long and distinguished career.

In Indianapolis, Dorothy and Phil found the congregation of All Souls Unitarian Church, where they found great community and friendship. In the 1950s, Dorothy began to play the organ for All Souls. She played for services, weddings and memorials and accompanied the choir as well as arranged music for special concert programs. She served

as the organist for many years and was a member of the American Guild of Organists. Besides the organ, Dorothy was also an accomplished harpsichord player. In 1984 she commissioned Bryon Carroll to make a pedal harpsichord. She held annual summer musicales in her home where she collaborated with local artists from the Indianapolis Symphony and the early music community.

In the 1960s, Dorothy took her first road trip to the Colorado Rockies. She was interested in photography and fell in love with the Colorado landscape. She developed a great love of off-road driving, hiking, horseback riding, and skiing while in Colorado.



Dorothy moved from Indianapolis to live with Brett. Her love for her family was foremost in her mind and she often said how lucky she was to have such a wonderful family. She passed peacefully in her home early in the morning on September 30, 2024, two days before her 102nd birthday.



The Music Director/Organist of our church is responsible for providing leadership for the Chancel Choir, serving as the organist and pianist during worship services and chancel choir rehearsals, as well as coordinating the overall music program of the church. The Music Director works under the supervision of the Pastor and in partnership with the Worship and Music Committee. This is a part-time (approx. 20 hrs. per week) professional position. Salary commensurate with qualifications and experience.

The Music Director shall:

• Provide organ music and choir direction for Sunday services

• Rehearse once weekly with the Chancel Choir when they are part of the service and direct a warm-up rehearsal on Sunday morning during the usual fall, winter, and spring seasons, excluding June, July, and August

• Plan the music program in cooperation with the Pastor and the Worship and Music Committee, with attention to the lectionary and liturgical calendar

- Meet with Pastor and Worship and Music Committee on an agreed schedule
- Provide wedding and funeral music for in-church service when available, according to Session guidelines and for a fee that is Session-approved
- Take responsibility for finding substitutes when absent
- Take responsibility for the preservation, organization, and updating music library with a working knowledge of copyright laws
- Assist with planning the summer music program and be responsible for planning music and finding substitute vocalists/musicians when the choral choir is not performing
- Provide guidance to the church regarding the condition and maintenance or repair needs of the organ and pianos
- Discuss promptly with the Pastor or the Worship and Music Chairperson any problems which may arise
- Give notice of termination of employment at least 30 days in advance of termination Qualifications:
- An undergraduate degree in music, preferably organ, from an accredited university
- Performance competence in organ and piano
- Experience and competence in selecting sacred and choral music and rehearsing and leading choral groups
- Excellent organizational and interpersonal skills

I have been looking for a better practice organ to replace my current one (analog Rodgers). Recently we found a 2-manual digital Allen organ from 1974 for sale in our home town. The organ is owned by the former organist at a local Catholic church who is now unable to play. The stoplist is very complete and not unified, with a combination action rather than the blind presets that were commonly used back then . We went to see it but it would not turn on. Later we went back with tools and checked for power. Everything seemed to have power but still it didn't start up. I hope you have an idea of what is wrong or know somebody who does. Please forward this message to AGO members especially those who know about Allen organs. I would be happy to hear people's ideas on this topic and I hope to hear back soon.
