Originally from Toronto, Canada, Michael Unger is a multiple award-winning performer who appears as a soloist and chamber musician in North America, Europe, Japan, and South Korea. Since 2013, he is Associate Professor of Organ and Harpsichord at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. He is a First Prize and Audience Prize winner of the National Young Artists' Competition of the American Guild of Organists (NYACOP), a First Prize winner of the International Organ Competition Musashino-Tokyo, and a Second Prize and Audience Award winner of the International Schnitger Organ Competition on the historic organs of Alkmaar, the Netherlands. Recent solo recitals include performances for national conventions of the American Guild of Organists, Organ Historical Society, and Historical Keyboard Society of North America; 'Five Continents – Five Organists' Festival at Seoul's Sejong Center; International Festival of Organ, Choral and Chamber Music Gdańsk; Internationale Orgelwoche Nürnberg – Musica Sacra; and numerous international and

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regional recital series. In 2018, he premiered two Preludes and Fugues by American composer Henry Martin for the national convention of the American Guild of Organists in Kansas City, Missouri. Recent orchestral appearances include Camille Saint-Saëns' Symphony No. 3 ("Organ") and Gustav Mahler's Symphony No. 8 ("Symphony of a Thousand") with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra. Other organ and harpsichord collaborations include Cincinnati May Festival, Cincinnati Opera, Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra, Collegium Cincinnati, Catacoustic Consort, and Publick Musick, with repertoire that includes Johann Sebastian Bach's complete Brandenburg Concertos and Sonatas for Viola da Gamba and Harpsichord. He received favorable international reviews for his debut solo recordings under the Naxos and Pro Organo labels, and his performances have been broadcast on North American and European radio, including syndicated programs *Pipedreams* and *With Heart and Voice*. He was a guest faculty at the 2015 and 2016 Smarano International Academies in Trentino, Italy, the 2019 Colorado State University Organ Week, and has given masterclasses at several North American universities and conservatories, including residencies with cellist Adriana Contino.

Michael Unger holds a Doctorate of Musical Arts with Performers' Certificate from the Eastman School of Music, where he was a student and teaching assistant of David Higgs and William Porter, and recipient of the school's Jerald C. Graue Musicology Fellowship. He is also a Gold Medal graduate of the University of Western Ontario, where he studied with Larry Cortner and Sandra Mangsen, and his post-graduate teachers include Roberta Gary in Cincinnati and Jean-Baptiste Robin in Versailles, France. Formerly the Director of Music at the Lutheran Church of the Incarnate Word in Rochester, New York, he currently serves as organist of Cincinnati's historic Isaac M. Wise – Plum Street Temple and is a volunteer chorister in the choir of Cincinnati's Christ Church Cathedral (Episcopal).

In 2011 Goulding & Wood built a new console for Trinity Church's Schantz organ as an initial phase in securing the instrument's place as the parish's main musical resource for the next generation. The entire organ was rewired during the season of Lent, and the new console was installed for use on Palm Sunday 2011. The hand-crafted oak cabinetry was designed and painted to match other chancel appointments. The console is moveable and low in profile, promoting sightlines with the choir, conductor, and other liturgical activity. Draw knobs controlling the stops of the organ are hand-turned solid ebony with engraved inserts. The terraces holding the stop controls are of ribbon walnut, as are the keyboard cheeks and the decorative music desk. Manual keys use cow bone for the naturals and ebony for the sharps, while the pedal keys are of maple and ebony. Within this traditional frame is a state-of-the-art control system with a digital processor and solid-state relays. This provides for expanded control of the musical resources of the organ as well as the ability to transpose, record, and playback music. Registration presets are available on 128 separate levels, offering organists a large library of tonal combinations at the press of a button.



# Fanfare

In October 2017 Trinity Church received a generous grant from the Allen Whitehill Clowes Charitable Foundation, Inc. for the revoicing and renovation of the organ. Trinity contracted with Quimby Pipe Organs, Inc. of Warrensburg, MO for this work, which was completed in June 2021.



- Provide wedding and funeral music for in-church service when available, according to Session guidelines and for a fee that is Session-approved
- Take responsibility for finding substitutes when absent
- Take responsibility for the preservation, organization, and updating music library with a working knowledge of copyright laws
- Assist with planning the summer music program and be responsible for planning music and finding substitute vocalists/musicians when the choral choir is not performing
- Provide guidance to the church regarding the condition and maintenance or repair needs of the organ and pianos
- Discuss promptly with the Pastor or the Worship and Music Chairperson any problems which may arise
- Give notice of termination of employment at least 30 days in advance of termination Qualifications:
- An undergraduate degree in music, preferably organ, from an accredited university
- Performance competence in organ and piano
- Experience and competence in selecting sacred and choral music and rehearsing and leading choral groups
- Excellent organizational and interpersonal skills
